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
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A Christmas without Snow

Asian Elephant "Speaks" Korean



The workers at Everland zoo in South Korea received a jaw dropping surprise when they realised that Koshik, the Asian elephant could speak Korean by putting his trunk in his mouth and making the sounds. The talkative creature can now say five words in Korean: good, no, hello and sit down.

This astounded his zoo keepers so much, that they videoed him in action, and the footage was sent to elephant communication researcher, Joyce Poole. Upon receiving the video, she pronounced it genuine and passed the information on to one of her former colleagues, Angela Stoeger, at the University of Vienna.

To reach the conclusion that yes, Koshik could speak Korean, Angela and her team had to carry out a series of investigations to confirm that the sounds Koshik made could clearly be distinguished as words.

47 recordings of Koshik speaking Korean were listened to by native Korean speakers, who were asked to write down what they heard. These people were oblivious to Koshik and his jaw dropping abilities, and so did not know what they were listening to.

The results showed that Koshik could be understood, and that the vowel sounds he made were registered particularly clearly. However, when it came to consonants, the reports written by the



native Koreans contradicted each other, as the different letter sounds he made were not easily distinguishable.

To prove that the sounds Koshik made were not natural elephant calls, his recordings were compared to those of Asian elephants. They were both completely different, and researchers continue to be amazed with his unique skill.

Joyce Poole, a Conservation Trust grantee for the National Geographic commented, "This is amazing. I can't see any chance that it is being faked and it is certainly a human voice that is being imitated".

Angela Stoeger, at the University of Vienna, commented, "He really developed a new way of sound production. Naturally, Asian elephants don't do this."

Koshik is currently enjoying his life at the zoo, and working even more with his trainers to improve his speech.

Are you dreaming of a white Christmas?



What do you think of when you hear the word Christmas? Presents under the Christmas tree, singing Christmas carols around a fire, a nice Christmas meal, snow? But what are the odds of getting a white Christmas this year?

In England there is a 20% chance of snow, in Scotland there is a 35% chance, a 25% chance in Wales and a 20% chance in the Republic of Ireland. As you

can see it is unlikely that it will snow on Christmas day this year.

But why do some areas of Great Britain have a greater chance of snow than others? Regional climates in Great Britain are influenced by the Atlantic Ocean and latitude. Northern Ireland, Wales and western parts of England and Scotland are closest to the Atlantic Ocean, so they are generally the mild-



est, wettest and windiest regions whereas Eastern areas are drier, cooler, less windy and also experience the biggest temperature variations. Northern areas are generally cooler, wetter and have a slightly bigger temperature range than southern areas. Wales and the south-west of England are the most exposed to the maritime tropical air which brings warm moist air.

An example of this could be that in summer the Northern Isles could be at a temperature of 15°C and areas around London could be at 30°C which is double the temperature of the Northern Isles! In conclusion, if you are dreaming of a white Christmas, don't get your hopes up just yet.

Have we lost the true meaning of Christmas?



Have we lost the true meaning of Christmas? Or do people still celebrate it as a Christian holiday commemorating the birth of Jesus? Apparently not - 62% of a surveyed British group said that they wouldn't be attending a Christmas service.

I was one of four lucky people recently selected to watch a touring West End musical performance as part of the Young Journalist Academy. The musical

Tracking Santa



On December 24th 1955, a mistake was made in Colorado Springs, USA that now makes Christmas a bit more magical.

A “Sears” department store advertised a number in the newspaper that children could call to talk to Santa Claus himself.

However, this number was printed incorrectly, phoning instead Colorado Springs’ Air Defense Command (CONAD) center. When children called, Colonel

Shoup, who was on duty that night, told his staff to give all the children that telephoned a “current location” for Santa Claus.

A tradition began which continued when CONAD was replaced by NORAD (North American Aerospace Defense Command) in 1958.

Today, NORAD relies on volunteers to answer all calls, making the program possible. The team handles 70,000 telephone calls a year, as well as numer-

ous emails and “tweets” from all over the globe.

On Christmas Eve, anyone can log on to the website and view the “Santa Cam”. This shows exactly where Santa Claus is, and what time he will be arriving at the next location.
